With much opportunity for growth, we have a bright future ahead.

MESSAGE FROM EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR OF PROGRAMMING

2023 Rising

It was a year of passionate commitment toward an

ever-renewing vision. Amidst tremendous change, from the continued unpredictability of a post-pandemic arts landscape, rising costs of creative production, and bidding farewell to the festival founders, we dug in to create beauty with both celebration and depth.

There is nothing more natural or constant than change. We have embraced new ways of being and doing, and through it all, we are rising.

We presented a series of carefully curated events, delivering a robust lineup of artists speaking to the theme of 'inter/dependence'. Artists were invited to explore shifts from fragmentation to connectedness, from individualism to togetherness, to inspire us all to awaken from our illusion of separateness.

This year's programming spanned live musical performances, a large-scale dance production, art-filled parties, classical and contemporary work, culinary experiences, and the Vancouver debut of one of Canada's foremost visual artists. We focused on celebrating local artists alongside superstars from Toronto, the UK, and Seattle.

We leaned into shared models of creating to maximize collective impact. A shared leadership model and collaborative curatorial voices ensured a breadth of representation in programming throughout South Asian artistic networks and beyond.

The curatorial approach combined research, celebration, and critical thinking to ensure the festival reflected the pulse of the moment and aligned with the festival's values. The result was an engaging, thought-provoking experience that drew from a wide variety of artistic traditions, bringing new artists and expanded audiences to the festival, and reinvigorating inspiration in the wake of a beloved founder team.

My deepest gratitude to our community - our generous artists, dedicated team, steadfast board, and gracious audiences, and to our ecosystem of sponsors, funders, and donors for their continued support. In this inter/dependence, we have a clear and bright path forward.

We believe now more than ever in the power of collaboration, creativity, and innovation to drive creative expression forward.

CURATORS

Embracing shared leadership and representation, ISF23 was designed through the combined talents of a visionary curatorial team.



Pawan Deol, Executive Director of Programming, was the "curator of curators," overseeing the overall vision with the intention to widen and deepen ISF23's artistic reach.



Anoushka Ratnarajah curated all of ISF23's Granville Island stages: events and presentations across visual arts, music, comedy, literature/ideas, and culinary arts. Previously the Artistic Director at Out On Screen, she has worked as a producer, facilitator and arts organizer with cultural organizations in Vancouver, Montreal, and New York.



Devyani Saltzman, previously the Director of Public Programming at the Art Gallery of Ontario and a founding Curator at Luminato, curated ISF23's marquee visual arts event featuring Rajni Perera (Toronto) for her Vancouver debut exhibit, *The Vessel With Two Mouths*. The accompanying artist talk and reception was a career retrospective of Perera's work.



Jarrett Martineau, longtime ISF Guest Curator, current Curator in Residence at the Chan Centre for the Performing Arts, and host of CBC's Reclaimed. He returned to ISF23 with this year's marquee music event; a dazzling exploration of sound worlds called *Rhythm Infinitum with Shabazz Palaces & Sarathy Korwar In Concert*.



We love our volunteers! In 2023 we were supported by 159 volunteers toward a whopping total volunteer contribution of 3827 hours.

Funding allowed us to meaningfully engage, train and involve numerous volunteers (with a high proportion of students and retirees) in a positive community-building experience. In a volunteer survey, 90% of this year's volunteers responded that they felt their work at the festival made a "very useful" impact on their community. 93% of volunteers found the staff to be "very friendly", and 96% of volunteers felt "very appreciated".



- New Digital Live Captioning System: ISAS is the first purchaser of this system in the arts community in Vancouver (to our knowledge). We quickly built out a shared infrastructure program so this resource could be used by the wider arts presenter community. At the time of this writing, beta testing is already complete with VIFF, Writers Fest, and PuSh. Numerous organizations are now considering purchasing their own captioning system and expanding this tool throughout the region.
- Masked Seating Zones: Partitioned seating areas
 distanced from wider audiences for those attendees who
 needed to wear masks for personal and health reasons.
 This provided access to those who may not have been able
 to attend in-person otherwise.
- Accessible website major developments toward comprehensive online accessibility.
- Dedicated event in collaboration with our longtime partner VocalEye, centring the experiences of Blind and partially sighted audiences.
- Other accessibility initiatives at ISF23 included:
 accessibility info for each event, sliding scale ticket prices, free events and exhibits, complimentary companion ticketing, early entry for people with limited mobility, front area reserved seating for people with vision or hearing loss, and a festival-wide ticket distribution strategy for complimentary tickets to social service provider organizations and low-income community.

VOCAL EYE PARTNERSHIP

Indian Summer Festival proudly partnered with VocalEye to enhance the accessibility of our programming for audience members who are blind and partially sighted. Our fifth-annual VocalEye/Indian Summer Festival Digital Watch Party was held on Wednesday, July 26th. While the event was open to all audiences, this watch party centred and privileged the experiences of people who were blind and partially sighted. Rajni Perera's The Vessel with Two Mouths artwork was showcased and described, as well as two comedians from Punch Up, and a set of musical performances from Mohamed Assani's Watersmeet event. Throughout the event audience members were invited to ask questions and share reflections. This was a successful event by every measure.





CULTIVATING A DIVERSE AUDIENCE

One of the strengths of the Indian Summer Festival is our ability to bring together an incredibly diverse audience who would not otherwise be in a room together. It is important to us that our audience is multicultural and multi-generational.







FINANCIAL RESILIENCE

We've historically cultivated four distinct revenue streams: grants, sponsorships, donations and ticket sales. Through pandemic turbulence and the massive hit to live event ticket sales models worldwide, our earned income stream nearly disappeared. Fortunately, Indian Summer has successfully offset these losses with steadfast support from funders and community, which enabled Indian Summer to retain staff, pay artists, engage audiences and carry out our mandate.

Given the state of uncertainty during this period, Indian Summer has fared remarkably well. ISF23 was joyful and triumphant for our community, and we remain committed as ever to nurturing multiple revenue sources. 2023 saw a modest return of sales revenue, and a renewed engagement from our Sponsor, Funder, and Donor communities.


